




NAME OF DESIGNED WORK:

CONCEPT

Bringing the inspiration from the 1970s into the present by using a concept of street wear outfit with high-class tailoring technique from various Thai materials (main material is based on Bangkok province)









Patchwork technique with silk embroidery, bead embroidery, and crystal embroidery techniques

Cross stitch embroidered fabric from SACICT, woven Jok cotton fabric, and hill tribe fabric



CONCEPT:

Inspired by the wearing of the donated clothing of hill tribe people in which silk represents the culture of people lived in plain area while hill tribe embroidered fabric symbolizes plateau people's culture. Implementing both types of fabric into the design express the culture blend.

YOUNG ORANGE POWER


CONCEPT

Design a pattern on the loom and use chest tuck cutting technique to achieve an elegance and sleek look

Local hand-woven fabrics woven in traditional techniques "Khit Sakit Luang (continuous supplementary weft and pulling techniques)" to create a woven pattern which resembles an embroidered cloth


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
QUEEN SIRIKIT CATTLEYA


CONCEPT

of "Thai Handicraft Fabric for All GEN".










Tailoring fabric into orchid flower, embroidery technique, and macrame technique




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
CREATIVE RICE OFFERING SET


CONCEPT


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
NAME OF DESIGNED WORK:


